Presentation:

The course addresses key issues in contemporary environmental philosophy, taking as its point of departure the long-standing debate over intrinsic (or inherent) value in non-human entities (animals, plants, ecosystems). Authors critical of the anthropocentric legacy in Western philosophy tend to endorse this form of value – but what does it take to make the case in a compelling manner? And what would viable alternatives to the mechanistic world-view inaugurated by Descartes look like? Can we envisage a cosmology, or a culture, that would be more in tune with humans' dependence on our other various "others" than the presently dominant one which seems so bent on destruction?
